

Master a technique to make unique

crystal and bead pendant

Enjoy a cracking Christmas by wearing this colourful pendant to your festive celebrations.

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the UK. She holds the prestigious Metal Clay Masters Registry credential at level four. This fun pendant is essentially

a hollow tube bead with cone ends. The elements are made separately and then constructed when they are dry. Using a wavy blade cutter gives it a festive edge. You can have lots of fun embellishing the basic pendant with stones, cut-out shapes or textures. Add colour using alcohol inks to complement your party wear.

- 20g of silver metal clay Silver clay paste
- 3mm Cubic Zirconia stone
- Chain and jumprings Soft polymer clay -Sculpey III™
 - Wavy blade Studio by Sculpey Polymer Clay Super Slicer
- Holly leaf cake decorating
- Sharp craft knife Small needle files
- Paintbrush
- Stiff stencil brush Sanding pads/sticks/papers 3mm drill and/or stone
- setting burr 1mm drill Tweezers

Small ceramic tile

- steel brush Alcohol ink - green
- StazOn gold metallic ink Alcohol ink blending solution

Tumble polisher and brass/



Decide how big you want to

make your central tube, before finding a suitable item to construct the tube around. It will need to be heat dried, so the handle of a burnisher would be fine. Roll out the clay to three cards thick. Check how long you need the clay to be to wrap around your form. Just overlap it and then cut it to size on three sides. Cut a wavy line on the overlapping end.



Secure the cones in the ends of

the tube using paste. Allow to thoroughly dry. Use thick paste and a stiff stencil brush to texture the inside and outside of the cones and the main body of the tube. Work in sections, allowing each section to dry before moving on. Dry completely, refine the cone ends with a file and drill 1mm holes for the jumprings to hang the pendant.

round it). Carefully wrap the

clay around it, making sure the clay is snug. Put a little water along the underside of the wavy edge and gently press this down onto the overlap to form a good bond. If you have already textured the clay, be careful not to spoil it at this stage.

Sculpey III or some other soft polymer clay, condition it well and then form smooth, pointed cone shapes in a variety of sizes. These are very useful for all kinds of metal clay projects so it's worth making a few. Bake the cones following the manufacturer's instructions.





When the tube and the cone are

dry on the outside, carefully remove them from the form and allow the insides to dry. Make another cone end using the same form as in Step 4. When everything is dry, refine the edges and ends, and test how the cones fit to the tube. The cones need to sit just inside the ends of the tube and make contact all round. Extra projects

Roll out clay to one or two cards thick and cut holly leaves for embellishment. If you're using a veined cutter, cut the leaf shape first, then press the plunger down to impress the veins before ejecting the leaf. Stick these in place on the tube using thick paste. You can use other shapes to embellish the tube or leave the rest with just the paste texture. Leave to dry.

Drill a hole about the same size as the stone using a drill or stone setting burr. Make sure the widest part of the stone is set right down in the hole. The flat top of the stone should be in line with the top of the hole so when you look across it, you can't see the stone. Fill the hole with thick paste and press the stone into it.



thick - it should be around three or four cards thick. Use the


against the cone. Leave to dry.

Sand any rough edges, smooth around the leaves with a cocktail stick and clean the stone thoroughly. Fire at 800°C for 1 hour. When it's cool, steel brush and tumble polish to a high shine. Apply green ink with a small paintbrush on the leaves and gold metallic alcohol ink on the rest of the tube. Allow the



ink to dry, add jumprings and hang the pendant on a chain.





- Alcohol inks dry fast so dispense a small amount onto
- a ceramic tile to use and replenish as it dries. Clean surfaces, paintbrushes and any mistakes using the
- alcohol ink blending solution. If you don't like the effect, reheat the piece to burn away the alcohol ink, repolish and start again.
